# Perturbation Bound for the Generalized Drazin Inverse of an Operator in Banach Space 

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#### Abstract

In this paper, we consider perturbation analysis for the generalized Drazin inverse of an operator in Banach space. An necessary and sufficient condition for the generalized Drazin invertible is given. The upper bound is given under some certain conditions, and a relative perturbation bound is also considered.


## 1. Introduction

The Drazin inverse arises in many fields, such as, differential equations, difference equations, Markov chains, and control theory [1,2]. The perturbation analysis for the Drazin inverse is useful in computational mathematics [2,7]. In recent years, many results on the perturbation bound for the Drazin inverse of a given matrix or operator have been considered in [3, 4, 24]. In [3], Castro and Koliha considered the perturbation for the Drazin inverse of a closed linear operator under some certain conditions, and also obtained an upper bound. In [5], Castro et al. studied perturbations for the Drazin inverse of a closed linear operator $A$, when the perturbing operator has the same spectral projection as $A$. In [20], Martínez and Castro considered the Drazin inverse of block matrices. Cvetković-Ilić investigated the generalized Drazin inverse with commutativity up to a factor in a Banach algebra in [8]. Xu et al. considered the stable perturbation of the Drazin inverse of the square matrices in [30]. In [10], Deng and Wei considered the perturbation for the generalized Drazin inverse of a bounded linear operator. They also gave an explicit generalized Drazin inverse expression for the perturbation under certain restrictions on the perturbing matrices. In [22], Rakočević and Wei investigated perturbation for the generalized Drazin inverse of a bounded linear operator over Banach space. Castro and Martínez studied additive properties for the generalized Drazin inverse in Banach algebra [6]. In [16], Huang et al. considered stable perturbations for outer inverses of linear operators in Banach space.

Let $X, Y$ be Banach space and let $B(X, Y)$ be the set of all bounded linear operators from $X$ to $Y$. If $X=Y$, then $B(X, Y)=B(X)$. For a bounded linear operator $A \in B(X)$, the symbols $R(A), N(A), \sigma(A)$ and $r(A)$ denote the range, the null space, the spectrum and the spectral radius of $A$, respectively. For any $A \in B(X)$, there exists $B$ such that, for some $k \in \mathbb{N}$,

[^0]then $B$ is called the Drazin inverse of $A$, and is denoted by $B=A^{D}$. The smallest nonnegative $k$ in (1) is called the index of $A$, denoted by $\operatorname{Ind}(A)$. It is well-known that $A \in B(X)$ has a Drazin inverse if and only if the point $\lambda=0$ is a pole of the resolvent $\lambda \mapsto(\lambda I-A)^{-1}$. The order of this pole is equal to $\operatorname{Ind}(A)$.

In [17], Koliha introduced the concept for a generalized Drazin (GD) inverse of an operator $A \in B(X)$. The GD inverse exists if and only if $0 \notin \operatorname{acc} \sigma(A)$. If $0 \notin \operatorname{acc} \sigma(A)$, then there exist open subsets $U$ and $V$ of $\mathbb{C}$, such that $\sigma(A) \backslash\{0\} \subset U, 0 \in V$, and $U \cap V=\emptyset$. Define a function $f$ as in [17] by

The GD inverse of $A$ is defined by $f(A)=A^{\mathrm{d}}$. If $A$ is GD-invertible, then the spectral idempotent of $A$ corresponding to 0 is denoted by $A^{\pi}=I-A A^{\mathrm{d}}$. Let $X=N\left(A^{\pi}\right) \oplus R\left(A^{\pi}\right)$, where $A \in B(X)$ is GD-invertible. If $A$ is GD-invertible, then $A$ has the following form

where $A_{1}$ is invertible and $A_{2}$ is quasinilpotent. Also, the GD inverse $A^{\mathrm{d}}$ is given by

0 & 0

N\left(A^{\pi}\right) \\

\end{array}\right] \rightarrow\left[\begin{array}{c}
N\left(A^{\pi}\right) \\
R\left(A^{\pi}\right)
\end{array}\right] .
$$

The motivation of the results in this paper is from those given in [10], which is considered the perturbation of the GD inverse in the following cases:

- $A_{1}+Q_{11}$ is invertible and $\operatorname{dim}\left[R\left(A^{\pi}\right)\right]$ is finite,
- $A_{1}+Q_{11}$ is invertible and $Q_{22} A_{2}=0$,
- $A_{1}+Q_{11}$ is invertible and $Q_{22} A_{2}=A_{2} Q_{22}$,
where $Q$ is the perturbing operator of $A$ and given by $Q=\left[\begin{array}{cc}Q_{11} & Q_{12} \\ 0 & Q_{22}\end{array}\right]$ with respect to the decomposition $X=N\left(A^{\pi}\right) \oplus R\left(A^{\pi}\right)$.

Some results on the perturbation for the GD inverse with suitable certain conditions are given in [4, 13, 19, 23-29] as follows:

- $\left\|I+A_{1}^{-1} Q_{11}\right\|<1, A_{2}+Q_{22}$ is quasinilpotent, $Q_{12}=0$.
- $A_{1}+Q_{11}$ is invertible, $Q_{22}$ is quasinilpotent, $Q_{22} A_{2}=A_{2} Q_{22}, Q_{12}=0$.
- $Q_{11}=0, Q_{22}$ is quasinilpotent, $Q_{22} A_{2}=0$.
- $\left\|I+A_{1}^{-1} Q_{11}\right\|<1, Q_{12}=0, Q_{22}=0$.

In this paper, we consider perturbation bound for $\left\|(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}-A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|$ with $A_{1}+Q_{11}$ being invertible and one of the conditions being given as bellow:
(i) $A_{2} Q_{22}=0, Q_{22}^{2}=0$; (ii) $A_{2} Q_{22}^{2}=0, A_{2}^{2}=0$; (iii) $Q_{22}^{2}=Q_{22}$.

Also, we give a relative perturbation bound for $\frac{\left\|(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}-A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|}{\left\|A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|}$.
Lemma 1.1. [14] Let $M=\left[\begin{array}{cc}A & B \\ 0 & C\end{array}\right]$ be a bounded linear operator on $X \oplus Y$. If $\sigma(A) \cap \sigma(C)$ has no-interior point, then $\sigma(M)=\sigma(A) \cup \sigma(C)$.

Lemma 1.2. [10] Let $A, Q \in B(X)$ and let $\sigma_{\epsilon}(A)=\{\lambda: \operatorname{dist}(\lambda, \sigma(A))<\epsilon\}$. Then for any $\epsilon>0$ there exists $\delta>0$ such that $\sigma(A+Q) \subset \sigma_{\epsilon}(A)$, whenever $\|Q\|<\delta$.

The following lemma is given by Theorem 5.1 in [12] and Lemma 2.2 in [13] (see [15] and [21] for the finite dimensional case).

Lemma 1.3. If $A \in B(X)$ and $B \in B(Y)$ are $G D$-invertible, then

are GD-invertible and

$$
M^{\mathrm{d}}=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
A^{\mathrm{d}} & S  \tag{4}\\
0 & B^{\mathrm{d}}
\end{array}\right], \quad N^{\mathrm{d}}=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
B^{\mathrm{d}} & 0 \\
S & A^{\mathrm{d}}
\end{array}\right],
$$

where $S=\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+2} C B^{n} B^{\pi}+\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} A^{\pi} A^{n} C\left(B^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+2}-A^{\mathrm{d}} C B^{\mathrm{d}}$.
Lemma 1.4. [18] Let $A \in B(X)$ be Drazin invertible. If $r(A)>0$, then

\operatorname{dist}(0, \sigma(A) \backslash\{0\})=\left(r\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)\right)^{-1}
$$

Lemma 1.5. [11] Let $A, Q \in B(X)$ be GD-invertible and $A Q=0$, then $A+Q$ is GD-invertible and

(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}=Q^{\pi} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} Q^{n}\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(Q^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A^{n} A^{\pi}
$$

Lemma 1.6. [9] Let $A, Q \in B(X)$ be GD-invertible and $A Q=Q A$. Then $A+Q$ is GD-invertible if and only if $1+A^{\mathrm{d}} Q$ is GD-invertible. In this case, we have

(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}=A^{\mathrm{d}}\left(1+A^{\mathrm{d}} Q\right)^{\mathrm{d}} Q Q^{\mathrm{d}}+Q^{\pi} \sum_{n=0}^{\infty}(-Q)^{n}\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(Q^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}(-A)^{n} A^{\pi}
$$

and

$$
(A+Q)(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}=\left(A A^{\mathrm{d}}+Q A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)\left(1+A^{\mathrm{d}} Q\right) Q Q^{\mathrm{d}}+Q^{\pi} A A^{\mathrm{d}}+Q Q^{\mathrm{d}} A^{\pi}
$$

## 2. Perturbation Bound for the GD Inverse of an Operator

In this section, we consider the perturbation for the GD inverse of an operator $A \in B(X)$. We present a necessary and sufficient condition for the GD invertible under certain conditions. An upper bound for $\left\|(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}-A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|$ is given, and a relative perturbation bound for $\frac{\left\|(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}-A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|}{\left\|A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|}$ is also considered, where $Q$ is perturbing operator.
Theorem 2.1. Let $A \in B(X)$ be $G D$-invertible and $Q \in B(X)$. Assume that $A^{2} Q=0$, then $A+Q$ is $G D$-invertible if and only if $(A+Q) A^{\pi}$ is GD-invertible. If $A Q$ is $G D$-invertible and $Q^{2}=0$, then
(i) $A+Q$ is GD invertible and

\begin{aligned}
(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}} & =\sum_{j=0}^{\infty}\left(Q(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j} A^{\mathrm{d}}+(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j}\right)\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{2 j+1} \\
& +\sum_{j=0}^{\infty}\left(Q\left((A Q)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{j+1}+\left((A Q)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{j+1} A\right) A^{2 j} A^{\pi}
\end{aligned}
$$

(ii) Further, if $\left\|A Q\left|\left\|\left|A^{\mathrm{d}}\left\|^{2}<1,\right\|(A Q)^{\mathrm{d}}\right|\right\|\right| A^{2}\right\|<1$, then

\begin{aligned}
\frac{\left\|(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}-A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|}{\left\|A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|} & \leq\left\|Q(A Q)^{\pi} A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|+\left\|(A Q)^{\mathrm{d}} A Q\right\| \\
& +\frac{\left\|(A Q)^{\pi}\right\|\||A Q|\|| | A^{\mathrm{d}} \|^{2}}{1-\|(A Q)\|\left\|A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|^{2}}\left(\|Q\|\left\|A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|+1\right) \\
& +\frac{\left\|(A Q)^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|\|A\|}{\mathcal{K}(A)\left(1-\left\|(A Q)^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|\left\|A^{2}\right\|\right)}\left(\|Q\|\left\|A^{\pi}\right\|+\left\|A A^{\pi}\right\|\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\mathcal{K}(A)=\|A\|\left\|\mid A^{\mathrm{d}}\right\|$.

Proof. Suppose that $A, A^{\mathrm{d}}$ are given by (2), (3), respectively. Thus, we have

Q_{21} & Q_{22}
\end{array}\right]:\left[\begin{array}{c}
R\left(A^{\pi}\right) \\
N\left(A^{\pi}\right)
\end{array}\right] \rightarrow\left[\begin{array}{c}
R\left(A^{\pi}\right) \\
N\left(A^{\pi}\right)
\end{array}\right]
$$

Since $A^{2} Q=0$ and $A_{1}$ is invertible, we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
Q_{11}=0, Q_{12}=0, A_{2}^{2} Q_{21}=0, A_{2}^{2} Q_{22}=0 \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

Thus, we derive

$$
A+Q=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
A_{1} & 0 \\
Q_{21} & A_{2}+Q_{22}
\end{array}\right]
$$

By Lemma 1.3, we can prove that $(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}$ exists if and only if $\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}$ exists. i.e. $(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}$ exists if and only if $(A+Q) A^{\pi}$ is GD-invertible.

From $Q^{2}=0$, we get

Q_{22} Q_{21}=0, Q_{22}^{2}=0 \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

By (6) and (7), we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)=\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)=0 \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

From the GD-invertibility of $A Q$, then $\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}$ exists. Hence, $\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}$ exits. By Lemma 1.6, we get

\left(A_{2} Q_{22}+Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}=\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}+\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} \tag{9}
\end{equation*}

Since $A_{2}^{2}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}+Q_{22} A_{2}\right)=0$ and $A_{2}$ is quasinilpotent. By Lemma 1.5 and (9), we have that $A_{2}+Q_{22}$ is GD-invertible and

\begin{align*}
{\left[\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{2}\right]^{\mathrm{d}} } & =\left(A_{2}^{2}+A_{2} Q_{22}+Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} \\
& =\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left[\left(A_{2} Q_{22}+Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right]^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& =\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}+\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n} . \tag{10}
\end{align*}
$$

Similarly, we obtain

\left[\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}+\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right]^{n+1}=\left[\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right]^{n+1}+\left[\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right]^{n+1}, n \in \mathbb{N} .
$$

By (10) and Cline's formula $\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}=Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2}$, we obtain

\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} & =\left(\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{2}\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right) \\
& =\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right) \sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}+\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& =\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right) \sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+\left(\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& =\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+A_{2}\left(\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}\right) A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& =\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+A_{2}\left[Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{2} A_{2}\right]^{n+1}\right) A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& =\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1}+\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}\right) A_{2}^{2 n} \tag{11}
\end{align*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{align*}
\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} & =\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}-\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} A_{2} Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n} \\
& -\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} Q_{22}\left(\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{n+1} A_{2}^{2 n+1} \tag{12}
\end{align*}
$$

By Lemma 1.3, we get that $A+Q$ is GD-invertible and

(A+Q)^{\mathrm{d}}=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
A_{1}^{-1} & 0  \tag{13}\\
R & \left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}}
\end{array}\right]
$$

where

$$
R=\sum_{n=0}^{\infty}\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{n} Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{n+2}-\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} Q_{21} A_{1}^{-1}
$$

Thus, for $n \geq 2$, we obtain

\left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{n} Q_{21}=\left\{\begin{array}{ll}
\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{n / 2} Q_{21,}, & \text { if } n \text { is even }  \tag{14}\\
A_{2}\left(Q_{22} A_{2}\right)^{(n-1) / 2} Q_{21}, & \text { if } n \text { is odd }
\end{array} .\right.
$$

By (6) and (12), we have

& \left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} Q_{21}=\left(I-Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2}\right) Q_{21}, \\
& \left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} Q_{22}=Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}, \\
& \left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} A_{2} Q_{22}=\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} A_{2} Q_{22}, \\
& \left(A_{2}+Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} A_{2} Q_{21}=\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi} A_{2} Q_{21} . \tag{15}
\end{align*}

Note that

& (A Q)^{\pi} A^{\mathrm{d}}=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
A_{1}^{-1} & 0 \\
-\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2} Q_{21} A_{1}^{-1} & 0
\end{array}\right] \\
& Q(A Q)^{\pi}\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{2}=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{2}-Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2} Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{2} & 0
\end{array}\right], \\
& \sum_{j=1}^{\infty}\left(Q(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j} A^{\mathrm{d}}+(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j}\right)  \tag{16}\\
& =\left[\begin{array}{cc}
\sum_{j=1}^{\infty}\left(Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{j-1} A_{2} Q_{21} A_{1}^{-1}\right. \\
\left.+\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{j-1} A_{2} Q_{21}\right) & \sum_{j=1}^{\infty}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{j}
\end{array}\right] .
\end{align*}
$$

From (13) - (16), we have

R & =\left(I-Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2}\right) Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{2}+\sum_{j=1}^{\infty} Q_{22}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{j-1} A_{2} Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{2 j+2} \\
& +\sum_{j=1}^{\infty}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\pi}\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{j-1} A_{2} Q_{21}\left(A_{1}^{-1}\right)^{2 j+1}-\left(A_{2} Q_{22}\right)^{\mathrm{d}} A_{2} Q_{21} A_{1}^{-1} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence,

\end{array}\right]=\sum_{j=0}^{\infty}\left(Q(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j} A^{\mathrm{d}}+(A Q)^{\pi}(A Q)^{j}\right)\left(A^{\mathrm{d}}\right)^{2 j+1}
$$

Now, by (13) and (17), we have
